LOVE FOR LINERS: The Vincent M Love Collection at SSHSA

Please join us as we welcome Astrid Drew, SSHSA Archivist, as she presents in-person, a visual program on the **Vincent M. Love Collection**, currently on loan to the Steamship Historical Society of America (SSHSA).

In this presentation, learn more about SSHSA's dynamic collections, with a special focus on the Vincent M. Love Collection. Mr. Love was a long-time SSHSA member and maritime enthusiast who worked for several shipping companies such as United States Lines. He had a particular interest in ocean liners and White Star Line's *Titanic and* collected widely. His collections include beautiful lithographs and posters, as well as *Titanic* artifacts such as passenger lists, a first-class deck plan, and a unique card catalog of passengers and crew.

The SSHSA is an independent non-profit focused on the history of engine powered vessels. At the presentation, an overview of the vast SSHSA collections will be provided. The SSHSA collections comprise hundreds of thousands of images, artifacts, ephemera, memorabilia, and artwork, as well as a maritime reference library located at the Ship History Center in Warwick, RI.

Astrid Drew manages and organizes collections and digital media and assists the public in learning more about the history of engine-powered vessels. She will also share some insights into this interesting and challenging role. Astrid holds a Masters of Library and Information Science, with a focus in archives and preservation, from Simmons College.

TITANIC, THE EXHIBITION

During the fall of 2022, "Titanic, The Exhibition" arrived in NYC after a run in London and is now centrally located at 526 6th Ave. On Sunday, May 7, following our May membership meeting at the National Opera Center, all are invited to join us for a short 15-minute walk to view this new exhibit created by the Spanish Company Musealia with contributions by Titanic historian Claes-Göran Wetterholm. The exhibition will be a "no host" event with all paying individually for the event. However, it will be a natural segue from our meeting topic on maritime collections with specific emphasis on Titanic and White Star related items.

Billed as far more than a display of historic items: "it is a unique narrative experience, a tale of the people aboard history's most legendary ship on its maiden and final journey. Travel back to 1912 through photographs, handwritten letters, wayward keepsakes, and other personal belongings telling countless stories about the fates and heroic deeds on board."

The exhibition contains over 200 original objects from Titanic and her sisters, in addition to life-size recreations of the ship's interiors. The exhibition is narrated through an audio guide, which includes sound effects, music and testimonies from Titanic passengers and crew.

Admission is \$39.00 pp with a \$5.00 surcharge if bought online. There is a special senior rate of \$30.00 for those who qualify.



THE LORD AND THE MAIDEN, A Cruise on the Lord of the Highlands to the Caledonian Canal and Scotland's Western Seaboard

Live and via ZOOM from the Rehearsal Hall at the National Opera Center in New York City Former WSS-PONY Chairman, Pat Dacey, once more captivated attending members and guests with his beautifully chronicled and dynamically delivered appraisal of Hebridean Island Cruises; their latest fleet entry, the 38-passenger, *The Lord of the Highlands*; and its 2022 7-day all-inclusive luxury maiden cruise he and his wife, Denise, took around the Scottish western seaboard. The trip included a memorable trip up and back in the iconic circa 1822, 62-mile Caledonian canal from Inverness to Corpach.

Pat set the stage for the evening's "virtual voyage" by sharing that Hebridean Island Cruises has been treating their lucky guests to fine Scottish country house settings, clubby and yachty atmospheres, and delightful cuisine and dining with attentive service by their friendly and professional staff for the past 30 years. More than 70% of guests are repeat guests to include himself and Denise and Queen Elizabeth II who twice chartered an entire Hebridean Island Cruises vessel, the beautiful Hebridean Princess, for herself and her family. Pat previously presented to members (November 30, 2018) the enjoyable and memorable experiences enjoyed on the Hebridean Princess.

In 2022, Hebridean Island Cruises purchased a former 700-passenger Turkish ferry, specifically narrower and shorter than her Hebridean Island Cruises predecessors with plans to initiate Caledonian Canal passages. In additional to the luxurious refits and finishing in both the public and suite spaces, the conversion also included the very important new propulsion, navigation, and safety systems.

Arriving portside in Oban, after a few administrative procedures to complete to include a rapid Covid test, guests were fittingly welcomed onboard with a glass of French champagne and escorted to their deluxe cabins with beautiful warm woods, detailed moldings, and tartan fabrics throughout the bright and spacious cabins.

For Pat's sailing, May 2 - May 9, 2022, there would be two surprises. First, due to earlier canal issues, the first two schedule cruises were cancelled so that the May 2 voyage would now be *The Lord of the Highland's* maiden voyage with only 17 passengers! Second, the Caledonian Canal technical issues were not fully resolved so the transit for the May 2 would not be an to end voyage but instead would complete a half-up and half-down voyage which luckily included the most interesting engineering marvel, Neptune's Staircase, with its 64-foot rise, 8-lock, 8-hour (each way) journey. At the same time, on this voyage, *The Lord of the Highlands* would also be the largest ship ever to transit the Canal and the Staircase. It was quite the tight fit!



Mornings and afternoons exploring local mansions and manors, walking paths, quaint towns, pubs, and more were very much enjoyed by all and provided for a perfect balance of daytime activities for the trip. The outer decks were also enjoyed by all. The warm wood-paneled Panorama Lounge, like other Hebridean lounges, was the heart of the vessel and a perfect place to finish the day's tours, enjoy entertainment, to linger for friendly conversations with other passengers and to close out the evenings with a nightcap. The attire for the cruise was generally smart casual but included 2-gala formal-dress evenings to match the festivities planned for the evening, such as Robert Burn's "Address to the Haggis"


Celebration, kilts and bagpipes included. The trip was perfected with gorgeous views of Scotland in every direction.

A Queen is Crowned: On Friday, April 14, Cunard celebrated another milestone in the construction of *Queen Anne* with the permanent placement of her iconic "Cunard Red" and black funnel. This construction process known as the "Funnel Lift" was completed at the Fincantieri Marghera Shipyard, Venice, Italy and signifies a major step towards completion.

Queen Anne will be the 249th ship to sail under the Cunard flag and will carry the distinctive funnel colors which have adorned its ships for more than 150 years. The color scheme of vermillion (red orange) with black bands and funnel topping was credited to Robert Napier, "The Father of Clyde Shipbuilding "and an associate of Samuel Cunard and partner in the British and North American Royal Mail Steam Packet Company, the precursor of Cunard.

Queen Anne is scheduled to sail round-trip from Southampton on her maiden voyage on May 3, 2024, for a 7-night voyage to La Coruna, Spain and Lisbon, Portugal.

An Italian Twist: With only weeks away from her NYC Debut, a new hull livery for *Carnival Venezia* has been unveiled. In keeping with Carnival's "Fun Italian Style" collaboration with Costa, the updated Carnival livery has been enhanced with a yellow strip on the hull to correspond with the traditional yellow on her Costa Funnel.

The *Carnival Venezia* is currently undergoing an enhancement project in Spain before she sails on May 29, 2023, on a 15-day transatlantic crossing from Barcelona and arriving at the Manhattan Cruise Terminal on June 13. Her maiden NYC departure for a 4-day cruise to Bermuda is scheduled for June 15, 2023.
